## Remarks by H.E. MURATA Takashi, Ambassador of Japan to Finland, Wadaiko Event on 11 January 2020

Ladies and gentlemen,

Happy New Year. I am truly delighted to hold this event at the beginning of the New Year 2020.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to Mr. SATOU Kensaku, Wadaiko, Japanese drum player, and Mrs. NISHIMURA Yukino, MC, who came to Finland from Japan for this event. My appreciation also goes to the members of Finnish Wadaiko Association as co-organizer of this event and all the other people concerned for their efforts.

Praised as "The man chosen by the spirit of the Japanese drum" for the unique way of playing, high level of skills and excellent ability of expression, Mr. SATOU Kensaku has been very active domestically and internationally. In September 2018, Mr. SATOU held a Wadaiko workshop and concert in Helsinki. A lot of Finnish audience was deeply fascinated by his impressive Wadaiko performances.
